SASHIKO with Rachel Barclay

Materials Notes & Fees:

The \$25 First-Timer Basic Class Kit should be purchased if you have never taken any of our Sashiko classes with Rachel before. The kit includes: one pair of Olympus Sashiko needles, one skein of thread, needle threader, mini-ruler, fabric pen, grid & templates, and a pattern guide. (If you are signing up for more than one of the Sashiko classes, you will only need one First-Timer Basic Class Kit.)

Communal Materials and Tools: colorful Sashiko threads, rulers, fabric markers and pencils, thimbles, thread conditioner, and scissors. Returning Sashiko students, please bring your needles, ruler, threader, grid, and circle templates.

Sashiko is a Japanese embroidery practice which uses a simple running stitch to create bold and geometric patterns on textiles. This stitching practice has been used for centuries and continues into our current times to mend, patch, strengthen, quilt, and embellish garments and home goods for longevity and beauty. With focus on exploration of the craft, workshop participants will learn how to handle thread, layout a simple grid, draw patterns, employ a Sashiko needle, and use "small stabs" to stitch designs onto their patch samplers.

Students will choose from six patterns; tiny ten cross, linked steps, flower stitch, squares and diamonds, ocean waves, and seven linked treasures. The beautiful stitched squares can later become a patch, a pocket, a framed textile, a tiny bag, or a coaster.

The \$15 Materials Fee is required for all participants and includes sustainably sourced Sashiko Sampler squares and one skein of Sashiko thread.

Decorative Mending celebrates resourcefulness and sustainability by showcasing hand stitching rather than hiding it. This workshop will highlight the act of mending and textile repair with Sashiko Japanese Embroidery. With humble beginnings in rural Japan, Sashiko's running stitch insulated work garments for warmth and longevity. Moving into contemporary times around the globe, the bold, geometric beauty of Sashiko continues to both strengthen and decorate fabrics.

Students will learn how to patch and repair a rip or hole, reinforce a worn area, and prepare their distressed textile in order to draw a Sashiko grid and pattern of their choice. Participants will employ the "small stabs" Sashiko stitching technique to repair or embellish their project!

Bring in one or two garments to assess for mending or decorating. Ideally, areas to repair will be no larger than four inches. Medium-weight, woven cotton fabrics work best; such as denim jeans, cotton or linen shirts, pants, cotton dresses. If desired, students may simply practice a Sashiko pattern or two on sampler patches provided.

The \$15 Materials Fee is required for all participants and includes sustainably sourced mending patches and one skein of thread.





F103: Hanafukin (Flower Cloth)

Hanafukin translates as "flower cloth". It is an embroidered cotton tea towel or kitchen cloth intended to be both beautiful and utilitarian. Stitching lore teaches that hanafukin were stitched by mothers as reference to pass along Sashiko embroidery patterns to their daughters.

With our cotton cloth as a canvas, we will use a simple running stitch to create a Sashiko pattern sampler of bold, geometric patterns and thematic floral stencil motifs. Participants will; use a Sashiko grid and stencils to layout designs, draw with circle templates and rulers to create patterns, employ "small stabs" to stitch geometric Sashiko, and learn strategies for avoiding or hiding knots. All skill levels welcome!

The \$15 Materials Fee is required for all participants and includes 14"x14" Japanese cotton Sarashi fabric, access to all the colorful threads, and supplemental pattern instructions.


